#### Orientation: Current Research

- Indigenous business development has grown rapidly over the past decade (though not new).
- Scholars beginning to explore Indigenous economic institutions in US, Canada, Aotearoa, Australia..
   (BUT largely from within dominant systems of knowledge.)
- Scholars also paying attention to X-cultural capitalism
- A tension between assimilation and self-determination

- Anglo Settler Colonial Liberal Democracies (US, Canada, New Zealand, Australia)
- Corporations as the preferred institution to engage in commerce

- 1976 Aboriginal Councils and Associations Act (AUS)
- 1984 Western Arctic Claims Settlement Act (CAN)

- 2006 Corporations (Aboriginal and Torres Straight Islander) ACT (AUS)



# Indigenous Values Are Embedded II Indigenous Corporations

- Family and intertribal relations integral to HR and other business decisions
- Business activities support traditional activities and events
- Indigenous communications
- Delayed-revenue generating branches in education, the arts, language, sustainability, etc.

# Capitalisms Can Include:

- Cross Cultural Economies
- Structures of Power
- Gender, Law, Governance, etc.
- Monitoring Policy
- Practical Applications (best practices, entrepreneurship, educational opportunities, etc.)
- Groups outside Anglo-Settler Colonial Nations
- Should problematize "dominant" worldviews
