 - 2 May 1858
 - 1860s Maori Land wars

TAAWHIAO



- Tawhiao
- Post-Raupatu Era
- Travelled to England to petition King George
- Paimaarire/Poukai
- Te Kauhanganui
- Te Paki o Matariki

MAHUTA



- Entered the Legislative Council
- Sought to formalise political influence of decision-making

Te Puea



- Powerhouse of modern leadership
- Old and New
- Mobilised the people
- Cared for the orphaned
- Constituted Turangawaewae
- Political Alliances

- Led a delegation to England to petition Queen Victoria

- WWI anti-conscription
